2 2020 ski Season

As you will be aware, no date has been set for the easing of the Coronavirus lockdown in NSW. There is also no decision from Perisher management on whether the resort will be open this winter. The following is reproduced from their website.

Will the resort be open for the 2020 winter?

Perisher continues to make preparations for the 2020 winter season. We are closely monitoring the progress of COVID-19 in Australia. As the season approaches, we will advise of any planned changes to resort operations for the 2020 winter season.

In our communication to you on 21 March, we said that our final decision would be sent to you on or before 28 April. That date was selected (partly) because the date for final payment on Epic passes was May 1. Since then Vail Resorts has announced that processing of those payments would be delayed until June 1. We interpret this to mean that Vail resorts is deferring their decision about opening the resort until at least June 1.

Consequently, we have to defer our decision about operating our lodge this winter until that date. You will be notified of our decision as soon as possible after June 1. However, you may wish to anticipate that the <u>most likely</u> decision will be that Maranatha will be closed for the 2020 winter season.

We apologise for any inconvenience.

<u>Equipment Review of sleds and Trolleys used to move essential equipment for back country ski trips.</u>

This review covers the pros and cons, costs, design problems and flaws of all the different devices we have used over the years to supply our back-country trips.

Cabinet door sled.

Design, one old cabinet door with two holes drilled into it for the tow rope and holes to tie the load onto the sled.

Cost. \$0.00

Only good for a one-way trip up the mountain then to be used as firewood.



Drinks Trolley Mk1

Designed and built by John Hefko. Made from parts purchased at the council recycling depot; consisting of road bike wheels, lawn mower handle and a gate for the decking.

Cost, very little.

Problems with the Drinks Trolley MK1; the Safe Weight Limit was exceeded with essential supplies. The trolley ended up with a buckled wheel and a broken handle on its maiden journey.

Drinks Trolley MK2 has mountain bike wheels and lawn mower handles at both ends. It has made many successful trips to the huts.

Furniture Trolley

Tough, simple, easy to use, no good in the snow, can carry heavy loads to inner circle of huts via the roads, barrels fit nicely into the trolley.

Cost is low.

Furniture trolley on a family holiday to Whites River Hut. Good base camp hut for skiing on the Rolling Grounds Range.



Aldi Sled

Plastic lightweight easy to pull. Not good for barrels, centre of gravity too high leading to roll overs. Must keep your load low. School groups tie the sleds onto the kids' packs so they can carry or pull their gear.

Cost, need to attend the Aldi winter sale and run to get the

limited stock. Under \$20.

Ski Sled

Made of 204cm straight old downhill skis with a raised decking for the equipment. Designed and built by John Hefko and pulled up the mountain by 6 strong skiers.

Problems, hard to control on a cross grade. Need skiers at the front to pull uphill, then skiers at the back for braking on the downhill sections. The ski sled is a great team building activity but not an effective way to move gear. It now lives in Aladdin's cave somewhere in Kosciuszko National Park.

Pulk Sled

Lightweight made of plastic with ridge poles connected to a harness or backpack. Skier has good control, reduced chance of roll over. Difficult to dangerous in trees or steep ground, great on roads or open ground. If you're going to ski to the South Pole this is the sled for the job.

Cost, bought this one from the closing down sale of Jindabyne Paddy Pallin shop for \$200.00.

How to combine your trolleys and sleds.

The trolleys move supplies to the food caches near the inner (closer) circle of huts via the roads before the snow starts. After the second dump of snow the vegetation will compact, and the sleds can be used. E.g. Schlink hut is the largest hut, 50m off a road, easy to find even in bad weather ideal for the trolleys reach. Next group of huts are Tin, Mawsons and Valentines which have little or no road access, need navigation skills to find these huts. Also crossing the Kerries Mountain Range can be tricky in bad weather. All this area is good for skiing with a sled. Everything past these huts requires river crossing skills, good navigation skills, lots of energy and a light pack.
